On a more somber note, I want to address the recent school shootings. It seems like every time you turn on the news there is another story about a school shooting or a hate crime. Each time I hear about another act of violence, I think 'this would not have happened if he or she had a mentor.' And it's true. People commit violent crimes when they feel disconnected, unseen and not valued. In contrast, when students feel more connected to school, they are more likely to engage in healthy behaviors and succeed academically. Elevators help create a sense of belonging and provide an outlet for students to talk about their struggles and triumphs. They also help students see that they have value and that they matter. As one student said of his Elevator, "[h]e makes me feel like a really important person, like I matter - and that's a REALLY, REALLY good feeling."

Kids need to feel that they have someone in their corner. They need to feel that someone truly sees them. Without this support, they are at a much higher risk of engaging in antisocial and dangerous behavior. With it, they can soar.
